# WHAT FOODS ARE TOXIC TO DOGS + CATS?

## Alcohol

Pets lack the enzymes to metabolise alcohol effectively. Ingestion can cause central nervous system (CNS) depression.



The high fat content can cause stomach upset, and the pit poses a foreign body and choking risk if swallowed.

## Caffeine

A stimulant that can affect the nervous, cardiovascular, and gastrointestinal systems.

## Chocolate

The darker the chocolate, the higher the concentration of theobromine and, consequently, the greater the risk.



These foods can cause a blockage if the pit is swallowed.



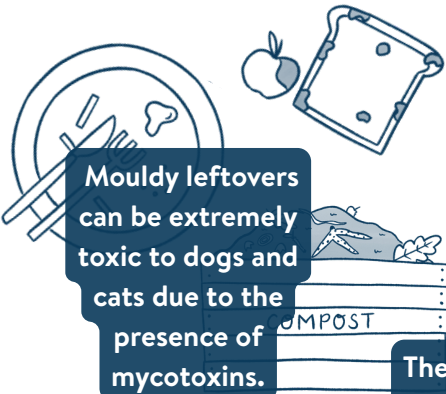
## Foods with stones

## Grapes + dried fruits

Even ingested in small amounts, these fruits are highly toxic.



Mouldy leftovers can be extremely toxic to dogs and cats due to the presence of mycotoxins.

## Macadamia nuts

The exact toxin in macadamia nuts isn't fully identified, but ingestion can cause a distinctive syndrome in dogs, leading to gastric and neurological symptoms.

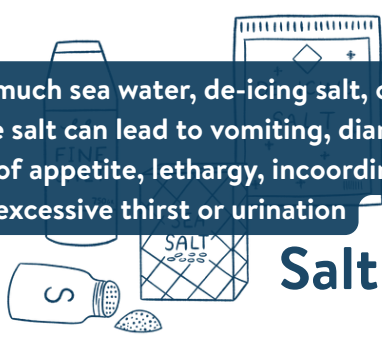


## Allium: onions, garlic, leeks, chives, shallots, etc

Alliums contain toxins called disulfides and thiosulfates, which can damage red blood cells and lead to anaemia.

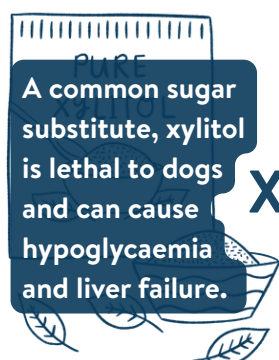


Too much sea water, de-icing salt, or table salt can lead to vomiting, diarrhoea, loss of appetite, lethargy, incoordination, and excessive thirst or urination



## Salt

A common sugar substitute, xylitol is lethal to dogs and can cause hypoglycaemia and liver failure.
