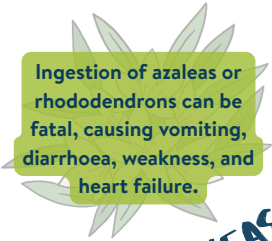
WHAT WILDLIFE IS TOXIC TO DOGS + CATS?

Adder bites can be extremely dangerous and lead to severe swelling. More potent during the Spring season.



ADDER BITES

Ingestion of azaleas or rhododendrons can be fatal, causing vomiting, diarrhoea, weakness, and heart failure.



AZALEAS

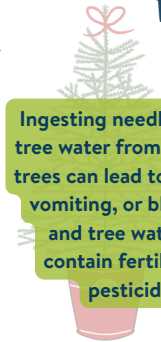
BLUE-GREEN ALGAE

Algae can contain cyanobacterial toxins that are harmful to dogs. Signs include diarrhoea, vomiting, fatigue, itching, and convulsions. In severe cases, it can be fatal.

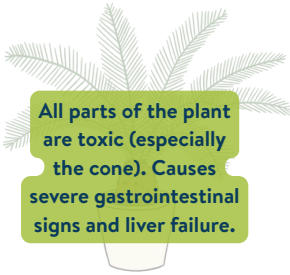


CHRISTMAS TREE

Ingesting needles, sap, or tree water from Christmas trees can lead to irritation, vomiting, or blockages, and tree water may contain fertilisers or pesticides.

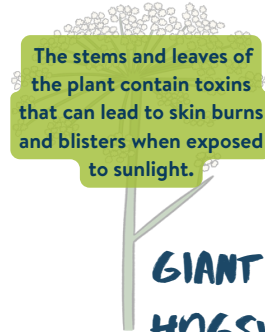


All parts of the plant are toxic (especially the cone). Causes severe gastrointestinal signs and liver failure.



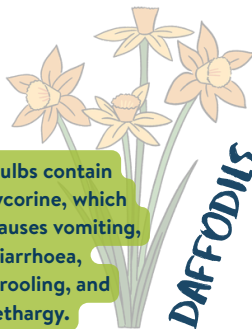
CYCAD TREE/
SAGO PALM

The stems and leaves of the plant contain toxins that can lead to skin burns and blisters when exposed to sunlight.



GIANT
HOGSWEED

Bulbs contain lycorine, which causes vomiting, diarrhoea, drooling, and lethargy.



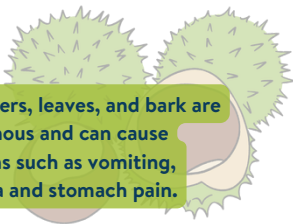
DAFFODILS

The leaves and berries contain saponins and other toxins that can cause severe vomiting, diarrhoea, and other symptoms.



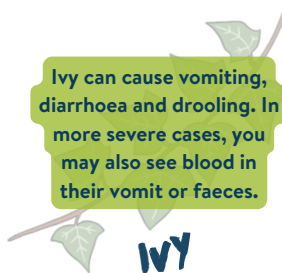
HOLLY

The conkers, leaves, and bark are all poisonous and can cause symptoms such as vomiting, diarrhoea and stomach pain.



HORSE CHESNUT

Ivy can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and drooling. In more severe cases, you may also see blood in their vomit or faeces.



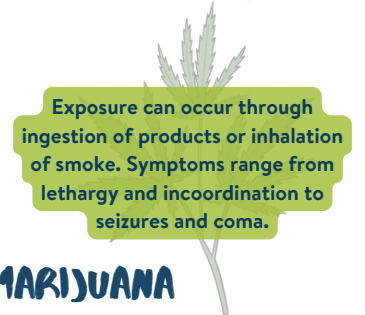
IVY

All parts of the plant are toxic to cats, including the pollen. Lilies are extremely hazardous, and ingestion of even just one or two leaves or water from the vase can be fatal.



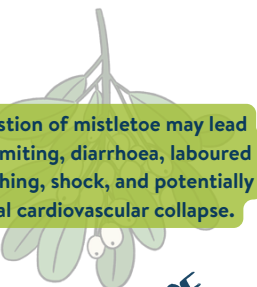
LILIES

Exposure can occur through ingestion of products or inhalation of smoke. Symptoms range from lethargy and incoordination to seizures and coma.



MARIJUANA

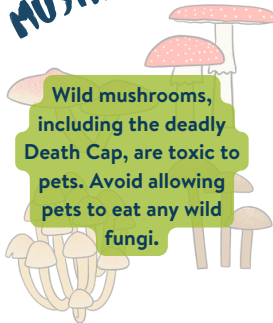
Ingestion of mistletoe may lead to vomiting, diarrhoea, laboured breathing, shock, and potentially fatal cardiovascular collapse.



MISTLETOE

MUSHROOMS

Wild mushrooms, including the deadly Death Cap, are toxic to pets. Avoid allowing pets to eat any wild fungi.

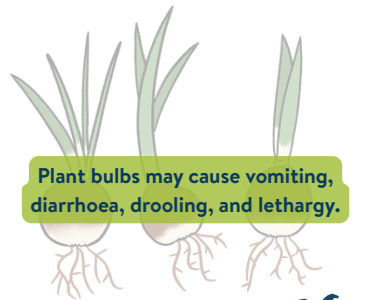


Acorn poisoning causes vomiting, diarrhoea, lethargy and potentially liver and kidney problems.

Acorns also present a choking risk and can cause a blockage in the digestive system.

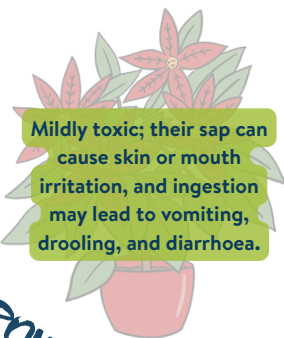
OAK (ACORN)

Plant bulbs may cause vomiting, diarrhoea, drooling, and lethargy.



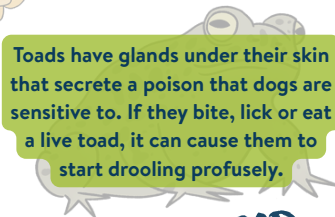
PLANT BULBS

Mildly toxic; their sap can cause skin or mouth irritation, and ingestion may lead to vomiting, drooling, and diarrhoea.



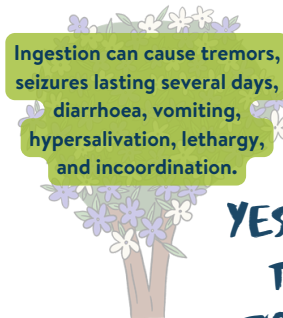
POINSETTA

Toads have glands under their skin that secrete a poison that dogs are sensitive to. If they bite, lick or eat a live toad, it can cause them to start drooling profusely.



TOAD

Ingestion can cause tremors, seizures lasting several days, diarrhoea, vomiting, hypersalivation, lethargy, and incoordination.
